Randy and Edith Woodley share how they have experienced the Indigenous value of hospitality:

The most formalized and, quite frankly, the most beautiful demonstration of generosity and hospitality in Indian Country we have observed is during the Pueblo Indian Feast Days. Each of the nineteen Pueblos has its feast days at different times from the others, and some even do this twice a year. We have been fortunate enough to attend two different Pueblo Feast Days.

WELCOME TO OUR PARISH

We are blessed to have you worship with us as we nurture each other in faith. While visiting our community, we humbly ask you to consider investing in our parish offertory and Diocesan Appeal to ensure our parish and Diocese can be your partner in faith.

On these days, everyone in the village cooks their finest meals, and then they open up their village to strangers and invite all to have a meal with them.... Originally, before colonization wiped out many of the villages, there were over one hundred Pueblo villages. If each of these feasts was spaced out at different times, that means any stranger would have access to food every three to four days or so. In this way, the generosity of feast days is not only an incredible act of hospitality; it is a huge safety net for the most unfortunate people in their society....

Recently, a group of six Native Alaskans showed up at our house for an unexpected visit. We had such a great time talking and visiting that, before we knew it, it was time for supper. With elders present, we knew we had to find something nourishing to feed the group—and quickly. We had a large pack of hot dogs left over from a recent event. We threw together all the cans of various kinds of pinto beans we had, and we ran to the garden to gather lettuce for a salad, which was the only vegetable in season at the time.

These are the times when you just make do with what you have. Generosity doesn't have to look like a lavish occasion or a perfectly executed meal. It just has to look like love.

EUCCHARISTIC SOLIDARITY

There is no more sacred ritual I perform within the church context than serving communion. It is a duty I do not take lightly. I relish the opportunity to preside over the table and invite others into a moment of remembrance and reflection. Whether in the most modest of sanctuaries or in the grandest of buildings, standing before the people with unleavened bread and a cup of wine (or grape juice, as in my own tradition) is a humbling act....

When I stand behind the table, calling the gathered community to remembrance, I call forth all their sacred memories: those connected to the biblical text and those that emerge from their own lives. In that divine moment and in this one, I take seriously the exhortation in 2 Peter 1:13: "As long as I live in the tent of this body," I will call the people to remembrance....

We do this in remembrance of the Holy One, who was and is and is to come.... In remembrance of the warriors for justice, the table turners, and the freedom riders. Those prophets who stood outside the gates of the city and declared the Word of the Lord. Those poets who penned indictments against inhumanity and degradation.

In remembrance of those who have experienced justice delayed and justice denied. Those whose sadness has yet to turn to joy, and those whose weeping has endured for more than one night.... We are all welcome at this table, whether with visible wounds or unblemished flesh, in the radical belief that only God's justice quenches our thirst,

heals our spirits, and renews our hearts. ...

Eucharist is the heart of Christian community. We know in our bodies that eating the bread and drinking the wine involve something much deeper and far more extensive than consuming elements of the ritual meal.... We [all] strive to become what we have received and to do what we are being made....

Eucharistic solidarity orients us to the cross of the lynched Jesus of Nazareth, where we grasp the enormity of suffering, affliction, and oppression as well as apprehend our complicity in the suffering, affliction, and oppression of others.... Eucharistic solidarity teaches us to imagine, to hope for, and to create new possibilities. Because that solidarity enfolds us, rather than dismiss "others," we act in love; rather than refuse "others," we respond in acts of self-sacrifice—committing ourselves to the long labor of creation, to the enfleshment of freedom....

At the table that Jesus prepares, all may assemble: In his body we are made anew, a community of faith—the living and the dead. In our presence, the Son of Man gathers up the remnants of our memories, the broken fragments of our histories, [and] judges, blesses, and transforms them. His Eucharistic banquet re-orders us, re-members us, restores us, and makes us one.
