20th Sunday in Ordinary Time Press on and never give up

The readings for this Sunday highlight the importance of humility, patience, perseverance and persistence in our relationship with God and others. The readings talk about the need for us to exhibit these virtues in our prayer life.

In the gospel, a Canaanite woman demonstrated great faith, humility, patience and persistence in her request to Jesus. She called out to Jesus to heal her daughter who was tormented by a demon. The woman's humble request was met with total silence. Jesus did not say a word in answer to her plea, an action which some people interpret to mean that he ignored or snubbed the woman. But it is believed that Jesus delayed a response to the woman's request in order to test her faith.

The woman was determined and she kept calling out to Jesus to heal her daughter. This prompted the disciples to ask Jesus to send her away because she was a nuisance and an embarrassment to them. He broke his silence by saying, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel" (Mathew I5:24). This statement did not put the woman off. Jesus pushed her a little further by reminding her of the historic barrier that exists between the Jews and the Canaanites. The two groups hated each other.

He said to the woman "It is not right to take the food of the sons and daughters and throw it to the dogs" (Mathew 15:26). These words were cynical enough to provoke the woman to anger. Jesus appeared to demean her by calling her a dog but she did not take any offense. She replied, "Please, Lord, for even the dogs eat the scraps that fall from the table of their masters" (Mathew 15:27).

Jesus was amazed at the woman for her undying and unshakable faith, humility, patience and persistence. He said to her in reply, "O woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish" (Mathew 15:28). And her daughter was healed instantly.

You and I have a lot to learn from the humility and unwavering faith of the Canaanite woman. Her great faith persisted above her feelings. She teaches us that it takes strong faith, humility, perseverance and persistence to ask, seek, and find help from God and others.

All of us pray to God for our needs but we are not persistent enough in our petitions. There have been times when you and I gave up in our prayers because we felt like nothing was happening, that God was silent and not answering us. The Canaanite woman challenges us to trust in God's power and goodness to give us what we truly need in his own good time.

She teaches us to have a gentle attitude toward life. Some of us are too quick to take offense at people especially those who press our button or irritate us. We fail to keep our composure or calm ourselves when pushed to the wall. We allow pride and arrogance to get in our way. The encounter between Jesus and the Canaanite woman opened a door to the gift of universal salvation. This encounter fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah as presented in the first reading. The prophet Isaiah foresaw an era when God's house will be a place of welcome for all people and nations; when all people will observe what is right and just and offer sacrifices acceptable to the Lord.

We are the people the Lord has called to himself, to break down barriers, to eschew human prejudice and indifference. We need to pull down the walls that separate us from those we consider different from us. Let us look around us to see those people, to accept them and acknowledge them as brothers and sisters in Christ.

Let us all ask the Lord to heal our brokenness and our indifference and keep us in his loving and merciful heart.
