Third Sunday of Advent-Gaudete Sunday Reioice in the Lord

I remember my seminary years in Ghana how many of us seminarians used to get excited when we reached the last week of each semester. We got excited because we knew that soon after our examinations we will head home to enjoy the company of our families, friends, and loved ones. Our feelings were right on point. We needed a break to rest our minds from the stress of serious academic work and other activities related to our seminary training.

Here we are, halfway through our Advent journey. We can already sense joy in the air. The liturgy for this third Sunday of Advent, traditionally known as 'Gaudete' or Rejoice Sunday, puts us in a joyful mood. It cheers us up. Today, we light the rose-colored candle on our Advent wreath as well as the other two purple candles to signify that the joyous season of Christmas is near. Our scripture readings also focus on the theme of joy. The readings exhort us to rejoice because our salvation is close at hand.

In the first reading, the prophet Isaiah was full of joy that God's Spirit came upon him to bring glad tidings to the poor, to heal the brokenhearted, proclaim liberty to captives and release to prisoners and to announce a year of favor upon people. The prophet Isaiah rejoiced heartily in the Lord that he clothed him in a robe of salvation and wrapped him in mantle of justice. He trusted in God's faithfulness and promises. He cheered his people who were in exile up to look forward with hope for the coming of the Messiah and for their liberation and salvation.

The responsorial psalm dwells on Mary's hymn of praise well known as the 'Magnificat'. Mary offered this beautiful prayer of praise to God when she visited her cousin, Elizabeth at her home. She exclaimed "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior" (Luke 1:46).

In the second reading, St Paul's echoes Mary's sentiments. He urges us to rejoice always in the Lord, to pray constantly, and to give thanks in all circumstances, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for us, (1Thess 5:15-16).

In the gospel, John the Baptist bore witness to Jesus Christ as the source of light, life, and the true joy of the world. He was the voice in the wilderness that called people to prepare the way for the Lord and make straight his paths. He was such an inspiring figure and exhibited honesty, integrity, humility, simplicity and faithfulness. Many people recognized John the Baptist to be the long awaited Messiah or Elijah or a great prophet. No wonder that the priests and Levites sent a delegation to him and to ask him about his identity. John the Baptist confessed that he is not the Christ but only a herald or precursor of the Anointed One of God. He did not consider himself as worthy of praise. He helped the people of his time to look forward with hope and joy for the coming of the Messiah.

John the Baptist is a model for our Christian life. He teaches us to be true to who we truly are and to offer a joyful witness to our Christian vocation.

We all need to recognize who we are in Christ. We are called to be voices in the desert, to bring the joy of the gospel to our weary world. Our mission is to bring others to know Jesus and to walk in the light of his truth. We respond to this mission through our daily conduct, words, and example. Sometimes our simple acts of kindness expressed in our compassionate listening to others, respect and empathy do make a difference in people's lives.

Let us all be open to God's grace and the gift of his joy for us. This week, let us think of what little thing you can do to bring joy to the weary and the brokenhearted. God bless,
