Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity

Our human life is filled with many wonderful realities including our capacity to live in mystery and with mystery. Sometimes certain things happen in life that our limited minds find it difficult to penetrate or understand them. We leave those realities to mystery and ponder on them. I am sure that many of you have read or heard the news about the incorrupt body of Sister Wilhelina Lancaster, a Benedictine Nun who passed away four years ago. Sister Lancaster's dead body was exhumed recently in Gower, Missouri and it appeared remarkably preserved. This incident is now the center of attention in Missouri. Isn't this a mystery? Maybe it is too early to call it so; but what else do you think that this phenomenon is telling us and the world? God is great. He manifests himself to us in both ordinary and extra-ordinary ways. Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. We reaffirm our belief in one God seen in three distinct persons. The Most Holy Trinity is a wonderful truth about God's inner life. This truth is central to our Catholic faith and life. The doctrine of the church teaches us that God is the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The Father generates the Son; the Son is generated by the Father, the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father and the Son #CCC 48.

The beautiful truth about the Godhead is that they all live in perfect unity and mutual love. There is no division or competition between them. This is a sublime truth about God's inner life but it is an unfathomable mystery. We can never wrap our heads around God's nature.

We need not worry about this as in heaven we shall get to see God as he really is and rejoice in his eternal presence.

All of us are drawn into the mystery of the Holy Trinity and undivided Unity. Each day we enter into the life of the Godhead, into their love and communion. Think of the sign of the cross we make, the baptism we received, the prayers we say and a host of things we do, they are all offered in the name of the Most Holy Trinity.

The mystery of the Most Holy Trinity helps us to know that God is not distant or far from us but that he is always with us and draws near to us. We find an example of this in the encounter between Moses and God on Mount Sinai. In the first reading, God appeared in a cloud and spoke to Moses. He revealed himself as a merciful father, full of compassion, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness. Saint Paul encourages us in the second reading to amend our ways and live together in love and nears. He prave for our goad, that the grass and peace of Cod will remain

in love and peace. He prays for our good, that the grace and peace of God will remain with us.

In the gospel, John the Evangelist talks about God's love for us and the world. He tells us that God so loved the world that he gave us his only Begotten Son so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life (John 3:16). God continues to love us. He frees us from our sins and offers us eternal life. He brings healing and wholeness to our lives.

The Lord is worthy of all praise and honor. Like Moses who bowed down to the ground and adored the Lord, let us also give praise, honor and glory to God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. And may our every thought, word, and deed always be an act of adoration and honor to the God of Might and Power.

Happy Holy Trinity Sunday to all of you. Congratulations to our three children who receive their First Holy Communion this weekend in the 10:30 am Mass. May they continue to grow in their love of God and others.
