Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Last weekend, we celebrated the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. We reaffirmed our belief in one God who is eternal in three divine persons, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. This Sunday we commemorate another beautiful feast, the Most Holy Body and Blood of Jesus

Christ, traditionally known as "Corpus Christi." We celebrate our belief in the real presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. Our Catholic belief in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist is so profound. We firmly believe that in the celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, Jesus Christ becomes truly and substantially present in the Eucharist. During the consecration, the power of the Holy Spirit transforms or changes the bread and wine into the Body and Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus Christ. We call this transforming action "Transubstantiation" (change of substance). This is a sacred mystery which our senses cannot perceive. Although we see what looks like bread and wine, with the eyes of faith these elements cease to exist in their form or substance after the consecration. The bread and wine completely change into the sacrament of Christ's own body and blood. In this sense, Jesus Christ becomes for us the Eucharistic meal. He unites us to himself and his divine life.

For us Catholics, going to mass and participating in the Lord's sacrifice is an extremely important part of our faith. The mass matters to us because it is the perfect sacrifice Jesus established for our sanctification and that of the world. When we attend mass we unite ourselves with Christ and his church in the sacrament of the Eucharist. We show ourselves as grateful people giving our loving response to God for his mercy and goodness to us and the people in our lives.

In the first reading, Moses urged the Israelites to remember God's tender care for them. He reminded them to remember how the Lord delivered them from slavery in Egypt and guided them through the treacherous desert to the place of safety. God took care of their basic needs. He provided water to quench their thirst and manna to satisfy their hunger.

In the gospel, Jesus identified himself as the living bread that came down from heaven. He stated that whoever eats his flesh and drinks his blood will live forever.

We are blessed as a church for the gift of the sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood, the sacred food which nourishes and sustains us on our pilgrimage of life. Every time we receive Holy Communion, the priest or extraordinary minister says those words to us "The Body of Christ or the Blood of Christ" and we faithfully respond "Amen". We say "Amen" to confirm our belief in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. We express our faith that Jesus Christ is truly the Bread of Life. We become united with him in a more wonderful way.

All of us need to understand what it means to commune with the Lord. We should receive Holy Communion with deep faith, respect, and devotion. It is sad to note that many Catholics today take the Eucharist for granted. Some of us approach or receive Holy Communion far too casually. The feast of Corpus Christi reminds us to receive the Lord in the proper disposition. This means that we live in the state of grace, free from sinful acts, especially mortal sin.

If we discern ourselves to be in a state of grave sin we should go to confession and receive sacramental absolution.

We are called to become what we believe, remember, and celebrate. The Lord wants us to be like bread broken and cup shared with others. As we hold our annual missionary cooperation plan this weekend, let us take the opportunity to reach out to our sisters and brothers who are less privileged in life and help them in their needs. Let us bring them the love and care of the Lord through our generous giving in the second collection.

Have an enriching feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ.
