1st Sunday of Lent

Lent is a time of new beginning or spiritual renewal. It is a time to go into solitude to confront and overcome the evil within us and around us. During this holy season, we strive to deepen our relationship with God through the works of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

On this first Sunday of Lent, our readings speak about God's faithfulness and the need for repentance, conversion, and renewal in our lives. The readings challenge us to keep to our baptismal covenant with God. In the first reading, the book of Genesis talks about God's covenant with Noah and the whole of creation. The reading takes us back to the time when God wiped out the entire creation due to human disobedience and sinfulness. The only ones who were saved were Noah, and his family and a few animals. They took refuge in the Ark for forty days and forty nights. After the devastating flood, God established a covenant with Noah and he promised to never again destroy the earth with water. God sealed the covenant with the rainbow to symbolize his faithfulness and loving mercy toward humanity. He set the rainbow in the clouds to serve as a visible sign of his covenant with the sinful humanity and his infinite love and forgiveness for us.

In the second reading, St. Peter refers to the events of the great flood in Noah's time and he sees it as a sign of rebirth pointing to our baptism. Saint Peter reminds us that just as Noah and his family and animals were saved, so too, we are saved through Jesus Christ in the waters of baptism. He exhorts all of us to embrace our baptismal call to holiness and live each day as true sons and daughters of God.

In the gospel, we hear about the temptation of Jesus. Unlike Mathew and Luke, Mark's gospel gives us a brief account of the temptation. He only tells us that the Spirit drove Jesus out into the wilderness and he remained there for forty days and was tempted by Satan. Jesus was with the wild beasts and the angels ministered to him. He resisted the devil and remained faithful to his father's will.

He returned from his desert experience to begin his public ministry. He announced that the kingdom of God is at hand so we should repent, and believe in the good news. This is the message for our Lenten journey, to turn away from our human weaknesses and return to God.

In this holy season, let us all strive to overcome the false and deceptive values in our lives and cling on to what is right and proper. Let us pray for one another and ask God who is always mindful of his covenant with us to help us to grow in holiness and grace.

I hope that you all have a fruitful Lenten season.
