2nd Sunday of Lent

I am not a movie fan but every once in a while I watch one or two movies. And I love those ones that have a sad beginning and a surprisingly happy ending. Such movies with upsetting beginnings put one through intense scenes before ending on an upbeat note, with a smile, and tears of joy. The first reading for this second Sunday of Lent seems like one of those movies that have a disturbing beginning and a terrific ending. The reading presents a story where God asked Abraham to sacrifice his only son as a burnt offering for him. I find this request to be too much and very disturbing. I wonder what went through Abraham's head. Why could God ask a parent to do such barbaric thing to his son? Does God favor human sacrifice? We are told that God was testing Abraham's faith and obedience.

Abraham proved himself as a person of deep faith and complete trust in God. He was obedient and willing to offer his son Isaac as a burnt sacrifice to God. Abraham went with Isaac to Mount Moriah and he prepared an altar to sacrifice his son as a holocaust to God. But the Lord intervened through an angel to stop him from plunging a knife into Isaac. Instead, God provided a ram for Abraham to make his sacrifice on the altar.

This story has a happy ending. God was pleased with Abraham's faith and obedience and he established a solemn covenant him. He promised to make Abraham the father of all nations. He blessed him and his descendants to be numerous as like the stars in the sky.

Abraham's willingness to sacrifice his son Isaac to God prefigures Jesus's ultimate sacrifice on the cross. It points to Jesus's faithfulness and obedience to his father's will and the price he paid for our salvation.

In the gospel, Jesus led Peter, James, and John up to a high mountain and while there, he gave them the glimpse of his eternal glory. Jesus was transfigured before his three disciples. His face shone like the sun and his clothing became dazzlingly white. Then Moses and Elijah appeared to converse with Jesus. These two figures represent the law and the prophets respectively and their presence bore witness to Jesus as the fulfillment of God's promises. Peter was engulfed in the transfiguration experience and he expressed his delight to be in the Lord's presence. He exclaimed, "Lord, it is good to be here." Peter offered to build three tents, one each for Jesus, Moses, and Elijah. A cloud overshadowed all of them, followed by a voice that came from heaven to declare Jesus as the beloved Son of God, and called all people to listen to him

The words from Peter are necessary for our Christian living especially during this Lenten journey. It is good to enter into the Lenten season, to climb the divine mountain and to glimpse the splendor of Christ and the glory awaiting us in heaven.

Until then, we are called to descend from the mountaintop, to leave our comfort zones, to abandon ourselves and sacrifice our personal interest for the sake of others. We are called to embrace the suffering and hardships that come with our daily duties.

Saint Paul exhorts us in the second reading that God's presence is constantly around us to help us to navigate the challenges and trials of life. He tells us that if God is for us, nothing can be against us or separate us from him.

As we journey through Lent toward the Easter glory, let us strive to follow in the footsteps of Abraham, in his faith and obedience and place ourselves in the presence of God and his loving care for our lives. Let us with the disciples, allow ourselves to be wrapped in the splendor and glory of God so we too can radiate the Lord's image and holiness to all those we encounter each day in our lives.
