# 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of Advent: Waiting in Joyful Hope.

Waiting does not come easily to any of us. It stretches our patience and unsettles our hearts, whether in traffic, a hospital waiting room, or a slow-moving checkout line. These pauses often feel like interruptions, delaying our plans. Yet, through the eyes of faith, waiting is never wasted. What seems like a delay is often God's way of preparing us for what lies ahead.

On this third Sunday of Advent, traditionally called Gaudete Sunday, the church calls us to rejoice because our salvation is near. The rose-colored candle we light today shines as a symbol of joy, reminding us that Christ's coming brings renewal, healing, and peace.

The scriptures reveal signs of God's presence breaking into the world: deserts blooming, captives freed, the blind restored, the lame walking, and the poor receiving the good news.

In the first reading, Isaiah proclaims that the wilderness will blossom and overflow with joy. He urges the ransomed to be strong and not be afraid, for the Lord comes with vindication to rescue and lead them home.

The psalm assures us of God's constant care and justice, turning barren places into paths of promise.

Saint James urges us in the second reading to be patient and strong while waiting for the Lord's coming. He points us to the farmer who patiently waits for the hidden seed to grow and bear fruit.

In the Gospel, Jesus affirms His mission not with words alone but through visible works-imparting healing, freedom and hope. These are living signs of God's reign already breaking into the world. The Lord's mission continues wherever wounds are healed, freedom is proclaimed and hope is shared. Each gesture of compassion, each word of encouragement and each act of justice, becomes a glimpse of Christ's presence among us.

We are called to embody this mission in our daily lives, becoming instruments of healing, voices of freedom, and bearers of hope, so that through us, others may encounter the nearness of God's kingdom.

As we journey through Advent, we are invited to open our hearts wide to the Lord's grace. In the stillness of this season, we wait with patient hearts and joyful hope, rejoicing that our salvation is near. Already, joy, peace, and hope are blossoming within us, preparing us for the fullness of Christ' coming. May these gifts remain with us and shine forth through our words and actions, touching the lives of all we encounter and bearing witness to the nearness of Christ, our eternal joy.
