

Understanding the Word

Paul recites the Lord's Supper tradition to the Corinthians because the rich elite members of the community were keeping this sacred practice in a manner that neglected and shamed the poorer members. Because this contravenes the unifying power of Jesus' death commemorated by the Eucharist, Pau has to, so to speak, get back to Basics with them. Since Paul's letters predate the Gospels, this passage is or earliest attestation of Jesus' words at the Last Supper. Paul was not there, so this was a tradition Paul received via apostolic transmission and passed on to the Corinthians. While blessing bread and sharing it at a meal was a typical Jewish practice, the Christian ritual connected this practice to Jesus' death. Jesus' words thus identify the bread as "my body that is for you." The cup is "the new covenant in my blood", recalling Jeremiah 31: 31-34, in which the new covenant brings a transformed relationship with God and forgiveness of sin. Paul interprets the celebration of the Lord's Supper as a proclamation of Jesus' death to be practiced until Jesus' return. Luke's version of the feeding of the five thousand (plus women and children) provides a lesson to all Catholics as well as to church leaders. The disciples have good reasons for suggesting that the crowds be dismissed: they lack enough to feed them and are in a deserted place without edible resources. Perhaps the disciples' awareness of the time of day shows their pastoral sense by wishing to grant the people enough daylight hours to get to the nearest town, which is Bethsaida. Nevertheless, Jesus bluntly tells the,, "Give them some food yourselves." To become true shepherds of the people, the disciples must take responsibility for their flock. The narration of the feeding itself has clear Eucharistic overtones: Jesus takes bread (and fish), blesses and breaks it, and has the disciples distribute it. That the leftovers fill twelve baskets suggests for Luke's audience that abundant nourishment comes from Jesus.
