21st Sunday in Ordinary Time

Choose whom you will serve (Joshua 24: 15)

Our lives are full of choices and decision makings. Each day we make routine choices regarding what to do and what not to do. We choose what food to eat, what clothes to wear, what place to go and when to get there. Sometimes we make good choices and right decisions. Other times too, we get our choices wrong. We make bad decisions and later regret and learn from our mistakes.

In this Sunday's liturgy our scripture readings admonish us to be prudent in our choices and decisions. The readings urge us to choose the Lord and his ways and forsake the world and its delusions.

In the first reading, Joshua, the successor of Moses challenged the people of Israel to decide whom they will serve. Joshua assembled the leaders of all the twelve tribes of Israel at Shechem and asked them to choose whom they will serve. The leaders and their people were to decide whether to serve the Lord who has remained faithful to them from the time of their ancestor's bondage in Egypt, their journey through the desert and their entry into the Promised Land or to worship the foreign gods of the nations and peoples surrounding them.

As a good leader, Joshua set the tone for the people to follow. He made a definite choice that he and his household will serve the Lord. On their part, the Israelites declared their loyalty to the God of their fathers. They pledged that they would serve the Lord and forsake the gods of the other nations. In the gospel, Jesus asked his twelve disciples to decide whether to follow him or to abandon him. Earlier some of his followers had left him because of his hard teaching on the bread of life discourse. Those followers were scandalized by his statement that unless they eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, they will have no life within them. This was a hard teaching for them, so they left Jesus and returned to their former way of life. The twelve disciples needed to make up their minds whether to walk away from Jesus or follow him.

Simon Peter provided a profound answer, "Lord, to whom shall we go, you have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe that you are the Holy One of God" (John 6:68).

Simon Peter spoke on behalf of all of us. Whom else should we go or turn to? It is only the Lord and him alone. The Lord is the only one who satisfies our deepest longings.

We are here at Mass today because we have made a decisive choice to serve the Lord. Jesus is everything to us. He is our life, our help, our hope, and our refuge. He comes to nourish and sustain our souls with his living word and the bread of life.

Today we declare our loyalty to the Lord for his infinite love and goodness to us. We renew our commitment to him and ask for help to reflect him in our relationships, marriage, or family life.

We take inspiration from the words of Saint Paul in the second reading and strive to live out our faith, to show mutual love and respect for each other. God bless.
