Palm Sunday

Today marks the beginning of Holy Week, the most solemn period when we remember and relive the events that brought about our salvation. During this holiest of week, we reflect more deeply on the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The liturgy of Palm Sunday begins with the blessing and distribution of palms followed by a procession. This first part recalls Jesus's triumphant entry into Jerusalem on the back of a donkey amidst hope, expectation, and jubilation. A large crowd of people waved palm branches and spread their cloaks on the roadway to welcome Jesus. They shouted hosanna, hosanna to the Son of David; blessed is he comes in the name of the Lord. The crowds recognized Jesus as the Messiah but of a different kind. They saw him as a political warrior, one who will save them from the oppressive rule of the Roman government.

But the jubilation was short lived. The same crowds who cheered Jesus and sang his praises turned against him and demanded his crucifixion. This is vividly depicted in the second part of the liturgy where we hear readings of the passion of the Lord. The narrative from Mark recounts how Jesus was abandoned, betrayed, and denied by his own disciples. We hear about Jesus' arrest, his unjust trial and condemnation, crowned with thorns, mocked, bullied and tortured, crucifixion, death, and burial. The passion story is always deeply moving for Christian believers. It puts all of us into a mourning mood. It is heart breaking why people subjected an innocent person to such horrible and inhumane treatment. Jesus had the power to knock the heads of his abusers off but he did not rebel against them. He demonstrated himself as a model of humility, faithfulness, and patient endurance. He showed to the world that he is the suffering servant of God described by the prophet Isaiah in the first reading. Jesus set his face like flint, and gave his back to be beaten, as well as his beard to be plucked knowing that his suffering and death will not end in shame but rather in glory.

In his letter to the Philippians, Saint Paul reminds us that although, Jesus was divine, he did not count equality with God. He speaks of how Jesus humbled himself to the point of death in order to fulfill his father's will. We are called to follow the footstep of the Lord in his self-emptying, humility, and obedience in our relationships and actions. For some of us, our cross or suffering might be an illness, the loss of a loved one, unjust treatment, being falsely accused, betrayal in relationships, separation or divorce. Like Jesus, we too must embrace our individual crosses and empty ourselves for others.

As we journey together through holy week, let us in faith unite ourselves with Christ in his suffering and go forward with him to Easter full of hope. Let us carry our spiritual palm branches and wave them in our hearts to welcome Jesus as our Lord and redeemer.
