25th Sunday in Ordinary Time Humility and service as the path to true greatness

As humans we often get carried away by our natural impulses and inordinate desires. Many a time we get caught in the grip of our ego and our craving for self-importance and superiority over others. Our selfishness and selfish-ambitions entice us to put ourselves above others. The readings for this Sunday's liturgy challenge us to keep our ego and self-promotion in check. The readings teach us to embrace divine wisdom and follow the path of humility and service. In the first reading, the book of wisdom talks about the wicked people who plotted against the righteous and just one because of envy and jealousy. The wicked persons called the just one obnoxious. They mocked him and conspired to torture him to death. The author of the book of Wisdom assures us that God will always be on the side of the righteous and deliver him from the hand of his foes. In the gospel, the disciples argued among themselves as to who was the greatest. The disciples allowed their human instincts to lead them to squabble about greatness, fame and honor. They failed in their understanding of the One who called them to be his followers. Jesus corrected the mindset of his disciples. He told them and all of us that the

one who seeks to be first must be the last and servant of all. Jesus used a

child as an example to teach them about the noble virtues of humility and

service. He teaches us that selfless love and humble service to others is

In the second reading, St. James addressed the issues of conflict and divisions that existed among the Christians of his time. He said that jealousy and selfish ambitions bring nothing good but rather rivalry, discontent, disorder, and foul play. St. James message is significant for our time. We live in a culture that is motivated by power, success, and selfish ambitions. Many hearts are wounded by hatred, envy, jealousy, and covetousness. These malicious emotions and some others rear their ugly heads in workplaces, in our homes and even in our church. Some of us get envious and jealous of others all because of their progress and success in life. We covet others because of their position and reputation. We need to tame such emotions or put them in check because they are destructive. They can make us unhappy and disturb our peace. All of us need to examine our thoughts and actions to see if they measure up to the teaching of Jesus.

Our Lord Jesus challenges us to abandon our self-importance and selfish ambition and embrace the path of humility and service, gentleness, and kindness. Let us follow his example of love and selfness and always seek the good of others rather than our own. With the psalmist, let us place ourselves before the Lord and ask our Heavenly Father to continue to sustain our life.
