14th Sunday in Ordinary Time:

Sent on a mission to heal and proclaim the Gospel

This Sunday’s readings invite us to contemplate God’s vision for humanity and our calling as Christian disciples. The readings remind us that we are always held in God’s loving embrace, a love that brings peace in uncertainty, joy in sorrow and a profound sense of purpose in our daily lives. In the first reading, the prophet Isaiah offers a tender yet powerful image of God nurturing His people, like a mother comforting her child. He paints a vision of a renewed world where peace flows like a river and joy overflows, replacing all sorrow. Isaiah’s message, first addressed to those in exile, still echoes in our hearts and lives today. His prophetic vision calls us to be bearers of comfort and hope in a world that often feels weary and wounded. The responsorial psalm urges us to praise God with joy, celebrating His mighty works and enduring kindness. It reminds us that gratitude and worship are the heart of our relationship with God.

In the Gospel, Jesus sent out the seventy-two disciples in pairs, entrusting them with a clear mission to preach the Good News, to heal the sick, and to bring peace to every place they visit. He instructed them to travel light, to depend on God’s provision through the kindness of others and to stay focused on their purpose. Jesus warned His disciples that they would face rejection, indifference, and hardship but He assured them that their mission was essential and would not be in vain.

He said: “The harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few, so pray to the master of the harvest to send laborers for His harvest.” These words still resonate today. Our world continues to hunger for peace, love, and justice. Many communities have yet to hear the Gospel, while others experience spiritual decline, disillusionment, or indifference-evident in declining Mass attendance, fewer vocations, and the weakening of family life.

So how do we respond? We begin by becoming light-bearers-reflecting God’s presence through our actions, our compassion and our witness. Saint Paul reminds us in the second reading that our identity is found in our relationship with Christ. Through Christ, we are transformed and called to bear witness to His love, bringing joy and peace to others.

Like the seventy-two, we are not sent because we are perfect, but because we are open and willing. God supplies the grace, and works through our generosity, courage and faith to reach touch lives and bring about change. As we celebrate the Fourth of July weekend, a time to reflect on the gift of freedom, let us remember the deeper freedom we have in Christ, the freedom to love selflessly and to serve with joy.

Let us go forth with open hearts, trusting that the One who sends us is greater than any challenge we may face. May we bring healing where there is hurt, hope where there is despair, and the light of Christ where there is darkness. Wishing you a blessed and a joyful Fourth of July weekend!



Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

As the Roman Catholic Diocese of Albany progresses with the “Remade for Mission” initiative, the first step includes assessment and information sharing so parishioners can understand their parish’s current state of affairs. The self-reflection and information sharing process is not based on one area but is wholistic and covers a broad-spectrum including parish finances, liturgical attendance, sacramental life, volunteer participation and involvement, serving the needs of the people in the greater community, and the many components required in fulfilling our mission to the best of our ability.

Over many years we have become inwardly focused and living in a state of decline. We must honestly and critically assess, identify, and share this information with our parishes so they have time to contemplate and journey from an emotional state of mind to a rational state of mind. Many parishes have already commenced this assessment phase and will continue to do so in the weeks and months ahead. However, there are some parishes where the people are not aware their parish is struggling to survive. All parishes will follow the “Remade for Mission” timeline of discernment and implementation, but parish networks that are already journeying through the assessment and information sharing phase and are ready to take action will have the flexibility to submit their recommendations to Bishop ahead of the April deadline.

“Remade for Mission” is a difficult, but necessary process for our Church to refocus on why we exist and do so to the best of our ability while being responsible stewards of our limited resources. Let us unite as brothers and sisters in Christ and foster strong and vibrant communities. Remember, we are called to love one another and go out to serve the needs of all who reside within the geographical region known as the Diocese of Albany.

More information will be shared about Remade for Mission as the process unfolds. This will require much prayer, and we call upon the Holy Spirit to provide the wisdom and courage needed to best fulfill our mission.
