1st Sunday of Advent: Stay Awake: Live in Expectation.

With Advent upon us, we enter a new liturgical year, a season of beginnings, promises, and grace. Advent invites us into hopeful waiting and joyful expectation. It gently calls us to pause, to slow down, to watch, and to wait with open hearts for Christ, who comes to bring hope, peace, joy, and love into our lives.

Today's scriptures remind us to live with hope, attentiveness, and love. Isaiah, in the first reading, offers a vision of unity and peace, proclaiming that all nations stream to the mountain of the Lord to learn His ways. His prophetic invitation is clear and profound: "Come, let us walk in the light of the Lord." It is a summons to step out of darkness and into God's radiant light.

The responsorial psalm echoes this joy, reminding us that true joy is found not in possessions or fleeting pleasures, but in God's presence, where peace and communion flourish.

In the second reading, Saint Paul urges us to wake from our sleep, for our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed. He calls us to cast off the works of darkness and clothe ourselves on the armor of light, so our lives may be pleasing to God. Jesus, in the Gospel, warns us to stay awake, for we do not know on which day the Son of Man will come. He recalls the days of Noah, when many ignored the signs and were swept away by the flood. In the same way, daily concerns and trivial pursuits can blind us to God's presence and voice. We, too, must guard against complacency and distraction, lest we miss the quiet ways God comes into our lives. Advent sharpens our spiritual vision. It teaches us to walk in the light, and to welcome Christ whenever He comes.

As we bless and light the first candle of the Advent Wreath, we are reminded of our Christian vocation: to be a light shining in the darkness, keeping hope alive in the hearts of those we encounter each day. This first candle is the candle of hope, hope that sustains us, strengthens us, and leads us toward Christ.

Let us ask the God of love and mercy to help us grow in His grace and holiness. May we remain steadfast in hope, vigilant in faith, and ready to welcome His coming again. And may these Advent candles pierce the darkness of our world and our lives, whispering hope, peace, joy, and love to every human heart. Have a blessed and fruitful holy season!
