Grandparents Day—September 7th

Worcester

We know quite a bit about the Blessed Virgin Mary, but very little about her parents. Apparently even their names—Joachim

and Anne—come from tradition rather than scripture, originating in a second-century text known as the *Protoevangelium of James*.

Through Mary—so deeply grounded in the faith of her people—we glimpse the power of generations who remained steadfast in prayer, hope, and devotion. Her courage, wisdom, and loyalty to family reflect a home rooted in love and faithfulness. At the foundation of that home stood Joachim and Anne, whose quiet, faithful lives helped prepare the world for the coming of the Messiah. Tradition tells us they were a wealthy couple who generously tithed and gave to the poor. They had long prayed and pleaded with God for the gift of a child—and in His perfect timing, their prayers were answered.

St. Anne's name means "grace," and Joachim's means "raised by Yahweh" or "established by God." These holy grandparents were given the gifts and graces needed to raise the Mother of God.

The feast of Saints Joachim and Anne is more than a tribute, even though their feast day is on July 26th, however the celebration is transferred to the first weekend after Labor Day. So, this year it falls on Sunday September 7th. The theme for the 2025 celebration is "Blessed are those who have not given up Hope" As grandparents, we are called to help shape future generations. In our Catholic tradition, grandparents are more than just caretakers or babysitters; we are memory-keepers, witnesses, and prayer warriors. We hold hands, wipe tears, tell stories, we offer our wisdom from our own life experiences and most importantly offer unconditional love that points back to God.

But what happens when our hands are tied, when, out of respect for our children's wishes, we are not allowed to openly share our faith with our grandchildren? In those moments of despair, I turn even more deeply to Saints Joachim and Anne I pray and I entrust my grandchild to their powerful intercession, praying that grace finds a way into his or her life beyond my words. I strive to be a quiet, and just be a joyful witness planting seeds through love, kindness, and example. I offer my prayers and longing as a spiritual sacrifice, And I never lose hope and patience because God's timing is always perfect.

St. Regina Virgin & Martyr Feast Day—September 7th

The life of this Saint is shrouded in obscurity. All that we know about her is found in Acts of her martyrdom, which are considered rather unreliable in their details. She was born in the 3rd century in Alise, the ancient Alesia where two



hundred years earlier Vercingetorix had fought so valiantly against Caesar. Her mother died at her birth, and her father, a prominent pagan citizen, entrusted the child to a Christian nurse who baptized her.

When he learned of this fact, the father flew into a rage and repudiated his own daughter. Regina than went to live with her nurse who possessed little means. The girl helped out by tending sheep, where she communed with God in prayer and meditated on the lives of the Saints.

In 251, at the age of fifteen, she attracted the eye of a man called Olybrius, the prefect of Gaul, who determined to have her as his wife. He sent for the girl and discovered that she was of noble race and of the Christian faith. Chagrined, he attempted to have her deny her faith, but the saintly maiden resolutely refused and also spurned his proposal of marriage. Thereupon, Olybrius went toward the incursion of the barbarians. On his return, he found the Saint even more determined to preserve her vow of virginity and to refuse to sacrifice to idols. In a rage, he had recourse to whippings, scorching, burning pincers, and iron combs—all to no avail as the grace God sustained the Saint. She continued to praise God and defy Olybrius. In the end, her throat was severed and she went forth to meet her heavenly Bridegroom.
