Tuesday, November 21 Memorial of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Wednesday, November 22 Memorial Saint Cecelia, Virgin and Martyr

Tradition has it that Cecilia, a noble Roman girl, was martyred around the year AD 230, during the reign of Alexander Severus and the papacy of Urban I.

The power of love

The tale of her martyrdom is in the Passio Sanctae Caeciliae, a more literary than historical text. According to the Passio, Cecilia was betrothed to the patrician, Valerian. On their wedding day, she revealed that she had converted to Christianity and vowed perpetual virginity. Valerian then agreed to be catechized and baptized secretly by Pope Urban I. Shortly afterwards, Valerian's brother Tiburtius embraced the Christian faith. The two brothers were soon arrested by order of the Prefect, Turcius Almachius. After being tortured, they were decapitated with Maximus, the officer who had the task of bringing them to jail, and who, along the way, had himself converted.

The faith that conquers death

Almachius then decided to kill Cecilia but, fearing the repercussions of a public execution given the popularity of the young Christian, after submitting her to summary judgment, orders that she return to her home to be locked in the steam room (which was to be brought to very high temperature), thus staging a death by asphyxiation. After a day and night, the guards

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found Cecilia miraculously alive, wrapped in a celestial dew. Almachius then ordered her decapitation, but despite the three violent blows to the neck, the executioner could not sever Cecilia's head. Cecilia died after three days of agony, during which she gave all her belongings to the poor, her home to the Church, and, no longer able to speak, continued to profess her faith in the Triune God, using her fingers.

THE GOSPEL ON THE HEART

The Golden Legend, the medieval collection of hagiographic biographies composed in Latin by the Dominican Jacopo da Varagine, tells that Pope Urban I, with the help of some deacons, interred the virgin martyr's mortal remains in the Catacombs of Saint Callixtus, in a place of honor near the Crypt of the Popes. On the eve of the Jubilee of 1600, during the Basilica's restoration by Cardinal Paolo Emilio Sfrondati, the sarcophagus containing the body of the young saint—in a marvelously great state of preservation—was found, with the body wrapped in a silk and gold dress.

USING OUR GIFTS

The Parable of the Talents in today's gospel focuses on the idea of stewardship and responsible use of resources. It encourages people to make the most of what they have rather than hoarding or hiding it. The servants who doubled their talents took initiative were rewarded whereas the one who buried his was rebuked.

The message is about action and accountability. It tells us that what we're given—whether it's money, skills, or opportunities—should be utilized for a greater good. It advises against complacency in using one's gifts and abilities. The idea is to grow and multiply these gifts, presumably for the benefit of the community or, in the religious context, for the Kingdom of God.

How do you apply the gospel's idea of stewardship to your own life? Are there areas where you feel you could be a better steward?

- The third servant in the parable is held back by fear. Can you relate to this? How does fear limit your actions?

(Everyone, everyone, everyone)

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Fear holds back the third servant, and he fails to do anything productive. His approach is caution to the point of inaction, and he's criticized for it. The parable suggests that doing nothing with your resources or abilities is not an option; it's a failure to meet a basic responsibility.

Thus, the gospel calls all of us to make the most of what we're given, for the benefit of both ourselves and others. It pushes the point that being a good steward of our gifts is a key part of ethical and religious life.
