Saint Charles Borromeo

St. Charles Borromeo was born on October 2, 1538 near Milan, Italy. He came from a wealthy family and is known for his work implementing the reforms of the Council of Trent and creating seminaries to educate priests.

When he was 12, he decided to dedicate himself to service to the Church. His uncle gave him the family income from a Benedictine abbey. Charles said that any of the income which was not required to educate him to serve the people of God belonged to the poor.

Charles's father passed away when he was sixteen. When his brother passed away a few years later, his family wanted him to marry and have children, so the family name would not be lost; but Charles remained steadfast in his desire to serve the Church.

His uncle was Pope Pius IV. In 1559, the newly elected pope asked Charles to come to Rome. Shortly after Charles arrived, the pope made him a cardinal. He had many responsibilities and he carried out his duties faithfully. He was ordained a priest in 1563. Just one year later, Charles became the Archbishop of Milan.

At this time, the Protestant Reformation was growing in Europe. Charles was determined to reform the Church. He felt clergy needed to be better educated, so he founded seminaries.

He promoted the decrees of the Council of Trent in his archdiocese. He ended the sales of indulgences and pushed for simpler architecture in churches, so they did not distract from the worship of God. Many clergy did not like his attempts to implement reform. At one point, a small corrupt religious order even tried to assassinate him.

When the plague hit Milan in 1576, he used much of his family's wealth to feed and care for victims. He also persuaded bishops and leaders of religious communities to provide aid to the sick and dying. He died on November 3, 1584. He was 46.

St. Charles Borromeo is the patron saint of those suffering from ulcers and intestinal issues, seminarians, bishops, spiritual directors, and apple orchards.

THE GREATEST COMMANDMENT

It has been said, "Love works for those who work at it." Our readings today tell us the same thing. Love does not come nicely packaged and colorfully wrapped. We must work at it, put it together little by little, day by day, and piece by piece, because love just doesn't happen.

Isarael's oldest law code gives a few starters for love. It begins by telling us to have a marked respect for all others, especially disadvantaged Israelites and resident non-Israelites. It calls for equity in personal dealings.

What Jesus seems to be doing in today's Gospel is cutting through the complicated and legislative subtlety of the Pharisees.

Jesus is challenged by a skilled scholar of the Hebrew Torah. It is not meant to be a friendly question since there are 600 commandments of the law.

Staying on safe ground, Jesus quotes the Shema since this is one of Judaism's most sacred ethical precepts and an affirmation of montheism. Jesus explains that loving God

involves a commitment of will, the heart, life itself, the soul, and the mind. In other words, the love of God must be a total response in faithfulness with no competing friendship.

Jesus does not say that among all the laws this is the greatest, but that the whole of Scripture, all the laws and the prophets, must be interpreted through this commandment. It gives the law of love a singular and primary importance.

To ignore our neighbor as we embrace God is unthinkable. Yes, God knows that love is a sweet and beautiful thing, challenging every ounce of determination and courage in us. It is a gutsy commitment that allows another to take us for granted. Sometimes, it will be easier to love the God we don't see and ignore the brother or sister we do see.
