"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice. Indeed, the Lord is near" (paraphrase, Phil 4:4-5).

A JOYFUL SUNDAY: The Third Sunday of Advent is also known as Gaudete Sunday. "Gaudete" comes from the Latin words "gaudium," joy, and "gaudeo," to rejoice or be glad. Gaudete Sunday is eight to 13 days before Christmas. Advent is a time of joyful expectation and eager preparation for the Solemnity of Christmas. The nearness of the feast is reason for great joy.

Reasons for Joy: There is joy in looking forward to the celebration of Christmas, and also joy in recalling the birth of Jesus on the first Christmas. The joy is heightened because he was born to save us from our sins (Mt 1:21b); it also extends to anticipation of the Second Coming, either at the end of physical life or the end of the world.

A Joyful Color: Rose represents joy and may be used as the liturgical color for Gaudete Sunday. Violet remains the official color for the Season of Advent, the Third Sunday included, because all of Advent has

a penitential tone, a time to be absolved of sin and be in the state of grace for Christmas. Gaudete Sunday offers a brief respite to focus on the uplifting, upcoming joyful celebration of the Nativity.

Joyful Prayers: The prayers in the Missal this Sunday convey a joyful message.

Joyful Scripture Texts: Isaiah says that he was sent "to bring glad tidings" (Is 61:1) and that "my God is the joy of my soul" (Is 61:10). In the Responsorial Psalm the Blessed Virgin Mary prays, "My spirit rejoices in God my Savior" (Lk 1:47). St. Paul insists that we should "rejoice always" (1 Thes 5:16). The gospel is John the Baptist's joyful declaration that he was sent by God to testify to the light, the one who is coming after him, the Christ! (Jn 1:7, 27).

GAUDETE SUNDAY: FAITH CALLS US TO JOY

Our current circumstances require resilience and the steadfast belief that joy is a healing inner event and a spiritual practice.... Dr. Barbara Holmes

We are not required to fight for our reality; we can just live it. We can be weird and whole and as shapeshifting as necessary, for we are being called to another purpose. We are being invited to awaken to our true nature as spirit beings, energy sharers, and prophets of potential. The joy spoken of in Holy Scripture is accessible, but also has a certain "beyondness" to it: The world didn't give it and the world can't take it away. As we hear from Jesus in John 16:22: "So you have pain now; but I will see you again and your hearts will rejoice, and no one will take your joy from you."

We have to prepare ourselves to live good lives of defiant joy even in the midst of chaos and suffering. This can be done. It has been done by billions of our ancestors and neighbors. Their legacy teaches us to see each intensifying episode of turbulence as a labor pain from which a new creative opportunity can be born. Life will be tough; the only question is whether we will become tougher, wiser, and more resilient.... The communities that learn and teach ... spiritual resilience will become vital resources for everyone. (We can hope that some Christian communities will take part in this work.) These individual and communal practices will help us dump bitterness, fear, disappointment, and toxicity and refuel with mercy, vision, anticipation, and equanimity. They will help us ignore what deserves to be ignored and monitor what needs to be monitored. They will help us reframe our narratives, so we can mourn, grieve, and lament ... even as we imagine, celebrate, and labor for the birth of a better future....

To trust in the process is another way of saying to trust in an intelligence wiser than current human intelligence, to trust in a love deeper than current expressions of human love, to trust in a desire stronger and wiser than current expressions of human desire. Christians refer to this wisdom, love, and desire as God or the Divine or the Creative Spirit, and others can find their own ways of naming it.... To use familiar biblical language, we will need to walk by faith through the valley of the shadow of death [Psalm 23:4], always holding anticipative space for something beautiful to be born, especially during the most painful contractions.
