The Papal Basilica of Saint Mary Major (Our Lady of the Snows) is one of the oldest and most important shrines in the world dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary, built at her request. According to tradition, a Roman Patrician, Giovanni and his wife, were childless and prayed to the Blessed Mother that she would designate an heir for them to bequeath their wealth. They had a vision in which the Blessed Mother told them that she wished to have a church built in her honor on the Esquiline Hill and the sign to verify this dream the prospective layout of the church would be outlined in snow...in the month of August.

When Giovanni approached his friend, Pope Liberius, with this news he was amazed to find out that on the night of August 4th, 352 AD, the Virgin Mary had appeared to Pope Liberius (352-366 AD) as well. She said a miraculous snowfall would occur that would outline where the church was to be built in her honor.

The next day August 5th, snow did fall on the Esquiline Hill in Rome in the middle of a heat wave. The people staked off the outline of the future Basilica before the snow could melt. Pope Liberius immediately ordered the basilica to be built. The event provided us with one of Our Lady's oldest titles, Our Lady of the Snows.

The Basilica houses the most important Marian icon, the Salus Populi Romani. Tradition attributes the image to Saint Luke the Evangelist, the Patron Saint of painters.

The relic of the Holy Crib, the manger in which Baby Jesus was laid to rest, highlights the importance of Saint



Mary Major as the "Bethlehem of the West." The first Christmas night Mass was celebrated here; Pontiffs have been keeping this tradition alive for centuries.

Among the Basilica's most important relics are the remains of Saint Matthew and Saint Jerome. Eight Popes are buried in the Basilica: Pope Honorius III (1150–1227), Pope Nicholas IV (1227–1292), St. Pius V (1504-1572), Pope Sixtus V (1521–1590), Pope Clement VIII (1536–1605), Pope Paul V (1550–1621), Pope Clement IX (1600–1669), and Pope Francis (1936–2025).

South African Archbishop Desmond Tutu (1931–2021) envisions God's dream for the world:

Dear Child of God, before we can become God's partners, we must know what God wants for us. "I have a dream," God says. "Please help Me to realize it. It is a dream of a world whose ugliness and squalor and poverty, its war and hostility, its greed and harsh competitiveness, its alienation and disharmony are changed into their glorious counterparts, when there will be more laughter, joy, and peace, where there will be justice and goodness and compassion and love and caring and sharing. I have a dream that swords will be beaten into plowshares and spears into pruning hooks, that My children will know that they are members of one family, the human family, God's family, My family."

In God's family, there are no outsiders. All are insiders.

Black and white, rich and poor, gay and straight, Jew and Arab, Palestinian and Israeli, Roman Catholic and Protestant, Serb and Albanian, Hutu and Tutsi, Muslim and Christian, Buddhist and Hindu, Pakistani and

Indian—all belong... We have heard of God's dream from His prophets throughout history and in modern times from great leaders and humanitarians like Martin Luther King, Jr. and Mahatma Gandhi. King spoke of it... when he dreamed of the day that the sons of former slaves and the sons of former slave owners in Georgia would be able "to sit down together at the table of brotherhood." Gandhi wrote about it in 1929 when he stated that his goal was not just the brotherhood of Indian humanity but "the mission of brotherhood of man." (Today they'd include daughters and sisterhood, too.) The visions and triumphs of these prophets of God helped change their nations and inspire the rest of us in our own struggles for equality.

We can look at the life of Jesus to see what God asks of us. Jesus came

into a deeply divided and polarized society. There was the divide between the hated foreign oppressor and the citizens of the vassal state. Within Judaism there were different religious groupings, the Pharisees, the Sadducees, the Zealots. There was the divide between the Jew, the Gentile, and the Samaritan. And then men were segregated from women. There were free persons and there were slaves. There were the rich; there were the poor. The world saw a veritable miracle unfolding before its very eyes as all sorts and conditions of women and men, rich and poor, slave and free, Jew and Gentile—all these came to belong in one fellowship, one communion. They did not regard one another just as equals. That in itself would have been a huge miracle. No, they regarded one another not just as equals but as sisters and brothers, members of one family, God's family.
