THE MIRACULOUS MEDAL: BRIEF HISTORY

In the night of 18 July 1830, Postulant Catherine Labouré heard a tap on her cell door in the convent on Rue du Bac in Paris. The door opened to a young child who told Catherine to follow him. He was illuminated as they walked the dark hallway to the chapel. Waiting for her was the Virgin Mary sitting in the sanctuary in the Sisters of Charity director's chair. Catherine knelt before the Blessed Mother, placing her folded hands on the Virgin's knees. The Blessed Virgin told her "to come to the altar where great graces are waiting for all who ask for them."

Four months later on 27 November, the Blessed Virgin appeared a second time in the chapel sanctuary standing on a large globe. She held a smaller globe which faded; multiple rings appeared on her fingers from which different colored rays of light beamed. Catherine understood these as symbolic of the graces that the Blessed Mother will pass on to those who ask for them. The vision changed again when, in the oval framing the standing Virgin, the words: "O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee" appeared. At that same moment, Catherine heard a voice instructing her to have a medal made of this scene and that anyone who confidently wore this medal

especially around the neck would receive abundant graces. The scene next revolved to show the reverse side of the oval. On it was Mary's monogram which illustrated: "to Jesus through Mary." The third vision nearly identical to the second.

Catherine told her confessor several times about the visions and the instructions given without success. It was not until 1832, that copies of the medal were first struck and not until 1836, that a commission to investigate the apparitions was approved. By then, however, people wearing the medal reported miracles, protections and graces received, especially patience. The popularly given title: Miraculous Medal.

Although it was widely known that a nun of the Sisters of Charity had received the Miraculous Medal, it was not publicized that it had been Catherine Labouré until her death in 1876.

My father, who has since passed away, wore a Miraculous Medal throughout his life. In the late 1960s and early 1970s various terrorist groups would hijack airplanes and take passengers hostage. My father traveled extensively for Exxon International. During one trip his international flight was hijacked and forced to land in Bahrain. The hijackers went through the cabin, taking any passengers they thought were Jewish, including my father. Out on the tarmac the prisoners were lined up and inspected by the hijackers. One guard noticed that my father's Miraculous Medal was sticking out between the buttons of his shirt. My father was put back on the plane and, a few hours later, the plane resumed its flight. None of the other prisoners had been returned to the plane.

Endings and Beginnings: Understanding the Church Year

In the Latin Rite Catholic Church, the Liturgical Calendar is the cycle of Seasons in the Church Year. It begins with the First Sunday of Advent and concludes at the final Saturday of Ordinary Time. The Church has six Seasons.

Advent is the first Season. The First Sunday of Advent begins closest Sunday to the Feast of Saint Andrew. Advent is the time for preparation for the Coming of Our Lord—both the anniversary of His Birth (Christmas) and His Second Coming. Advent ends December 24th.

The Christmas Season begins with the Feast of the Nativity of the Lord (Christmas) and continues through the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. The Christmas Season is a time of happiness and rejoicing.

Ash Wednesday and concludes use this time for reflection, prayer,

penance and alms giving/works of charity. The 40 days of Lent recall Jesus' 40 days in the desert as well as the 40 years the Israelites spent wandering after escaping from Egypt led by Moses. Lent does not include Sundays; those days are set aside for celebrating the Resurrection.

The Paschal Triduum—Good Friday, Holy Saturday, Easter Sunday—is the three-day period named after Jesus' offering Himself as the New Covenant Passover Lamb and concludes with Vespers Easter Sunday. The Easter Season begins with Easter Vigil celebrations beginning after sundown on Holy Saturday, and concludes with Pentecost. This is the most joyous Season.

The second part of the Ordinary Time season begins the Monday after Pentecost, and goes the remainder of the year through until the final day before Advent. This Season acknowledges Christ as King of Kings and that we are living in the Age of the Church. This part of Ordinary Time is about the time between the Age of the Apostles and the Age of Christ's Second Coming, the Time we are preparing for. The final Sunday in Ordinary Time is the Feast of Christ the King, which falls right before or after Thanksgiving. Advent then begins the following Sunday.
