#### St. John of Damascus or St. John Damascene

A priest and religious, he became a doctor of the Church and is the last Church Father. The Church regards the age of the Church Fathers as ending in the East with the life of St. John of Damascus, who died around A.D. 749. (In the West, the age of the Church Fathers is commonly reckoned as ending with St. Isidore of Seville, who died in A.D. 636.)

John was born into a wealthy Christian family in A.D. 675 or 676, and he lived to about 75, dying around A.D. 749. At an early age he assumed the role, perhaps already held by his father, of treasurer of the Caliphate. Very soon, however, dissatisfied with life at court, he decided on a monastic life and entered the monastery of Mar Saba, near Jerusalem around 700. He never again left the monastery but dedicated his energy to self-discipline and literary work, and engaged in a certain amount of pastoral activity, as is shown by his numerous homilies.

John was born in Damascus, in the modern state of Syria, just north of Israel. It's the same city St. Paul was traveling to when he experienced his conversion. Damascus is about 135 miles north of Jerusalem. He is also known as "Chrysorrhoas" (Greek),

meaning "streaming with gold" or "gold-pouring," indicating the quality of his writings.

John was among the first to distinguish, in the cult, both public and private, of the Christians, between worship ('latreia'), and veneration ('proskynesis'): The first can only be offered to God, spiritual above all else, the second, on the other hand, can make use of an image to address the one whom the image represents. This was a matter of great debate in the Islamic world, which accepts the Jewish tradition of the total exclusion of cult images. Christians, on the other hand, in this context, have discussed the problem and found a justification for the veneration of images.

John was an eyewitness of the passage from the Greek and Syrian Christian cultures shared by the Eastern part of the Byzantine Empire to the Islamic culture, which spread through its military conquests in the territory commonly known as the Middle or Near East.

#### CALLED TO BE PEACEMAKERS

The first Sunday of Advent invites us to look at Isaiah's vision of a world united in peace. Isaiah describes nations coming together, setting aside their weapons, and choosing understanding over conflict. This picture of unity shows God's hope for humanity, a world where we seek peace with one another. Advent is a time to reflect on how we, too, can create peace in our families, communities, within ourselves.

Being a peacemaker doesn't mean ignoring problems or pretending there's no conflict. It means working for solutions that bring people closer together instead of tearing them apart. Just as Isaiah speaks of nations working side by side, we are called to find ways to understand each other, even in disagreement. This vision reminds us that we each play a role in creating harmony wherever we are.

As we prepare for the coming of Christ, peace becomes more than a distant hope; it's something we can practice. Advent encourages us to be peacemakers with patience, love, and respect. We can ask ourselves how we can bring a little more peace to our relationships. By doing so, we participate in God's vision for unity and readiness to welcome Christ into our world.

#### Choosing to Live in the Light

Paul's message reminds us to live in the light and leave behind actions that keep us in darkness. He describes a life of kindness, honesty, and hope as a way to step forward. Advent is a season to think about our actions and to choose the light, putting aside behaviors that keep us far from God's love and from each other.

Living in the light doesn't mean we're perfect, but it means we make an effort to reflect Jesus in our daily lives. It can be small actions like choosing kindness over anger or being truthful in situations where we might not want to be. Paul encourages us to keep working to make choices that reflect who we want to be as followers of Christ. These choices help us be ready to welcome Him.

## For Reflection

- ★ How can I bring more peace into my relationships during Advent, especially with those closest to me?
- ★ How can I invite more honesty and kindness into my actions and conversations?

As Advent begins, we're invited to let go of darkness, such as selfishness, impatience, or fear. We're called to step forward, choosing the light in how we think, act, and treat others. This Sunday calls us to prepare ourselves for Jesus' coming by living with faith, even when it's hard. As we choose the light, we open ourselves to God's love and grace.
