WE PRAY LENT

Our worship space is simple, stark, and prayerful. Purples remind us of our call to continual conversion. Reds beckon us to live as a holy sacrifice for others. Bold willow branches help us to look forward to eternal spring; their winding twigs lead us along our pilgrim journey. The waters of our Baptismal Font are stilled until Easter. Our Eucharist is a sacred conversation with God and a sacred conversation with each other. The Cross centers us in our mission. We reverently gather together asking our Lord to keep us ever near the healing, freedom giving Cross of Jesus; may the Glory of God uplift us in life giving faith. We acknowledge the sin and need for our own healing among us and the whole world. We invoke God's Spirit in chant: "Holy Spirit, come to us, kindle in us the fire of your love. Holy Spirit, come to us, Holy Spirit come to us." We trust that God lead us and accompany us as we follow Jesus as credible disciples of faith. Our response to the Hebrew Scriptures is Psalm 103: "Loving and forgiving are you O Lord; slow to anger, rich in kindness, loving and forgiving are you." We recall how our Creator has always been among us, sharing the Divine gifts of wisdom and peace; as Heaven soars above, so God's mercy abounds. We approach the Gospel in stillness, with wonder and awe, as we hear God's story unfold among us. The Lord invites us to gather around the Table to be renewed by Christ's real presence as food for our journey.

We sing of our mystery: "We proclaim your Death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again." We are empowered to embrace the Cross of our neighbors as a community of life. Our Eucharistic prayer engages us to be the sacrament of Christ in our whole world. We sing: "We are God's People, beloved in Christ." The Great Amen culminates our prayer of thanksgiving. After sharing Communion, we listen and hear God speak tenderly, gently to each one of us, "I have loved you with an everlasting love, I have called you and you are mine." We respond wholeheartedly, invigorated in hope and faith to go forth as beloved, yet humble people abounding in peace, compassion, and love for our world! And Christ is with you.

LENT FOR US

The liturgical season of Lent is rich with the themes of Christian discipleship. Like all seasons, it passes but is also an opportunity to (re)adopt its themes of introspection, examination of conscience and life, self-denial and self-donation, and ongoing conversion in what it means to live as Christ-followers, as a way of thinking and being, as a whole identity. Drawing on biblical themes, Lent is meant to have ongoing implications and applications in real-world practical ways with the way we live our lives, how we treat others, the sort of persons we become. For these reasons the scriptural readings resound with the biblical imagery of desert and journey, and practices such as fasting and almsgiving. The readings also focus on the state of human alienation from God, neighbor, nature, and oneself – sin.

They call us to take sin and its destructive outcomes seriously, whether personal, interpersonal, societal, global, or environmental. Simultaneously the scriptures call us to take the love of God **even more** seriously. For God's love is able to heal, restore, regenerate, transform, and able to open up possibilities where no potential seems possible. It is in Jesus that God has loved us with a human heart and loved us "to the end". It is a love that saves us "in every way that human beings can be saved" and therefore divine salvation is also a very this-worldly experience. For this reason, the Christian experience of divine grace expressed in, and strengthened by, the scriptural witness focuses how we live our lives in light of the gospel of the life, teaching, passion, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Lent is also a journey leading toward the "Great Week" of the Christian calendar. Each year Christians walk this journey in preparation to renew our baptismal promises during Easter. Lent is an invitation toward transfiguration of ourselves and of our world. In and through Holy Week, the Great Week of the Christian calendar, Christian communities everywhere participate in the suffering, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Through our liturgies, scriptures, traditions, and prayers we unite ourselves to Jesus Christ as he united with us. We accompany him in his suffering and are united in his victory over death. We are present to him, and he is present to us as he joined humanity in our many forms of crucifixion – poverty, war, prejudice, oppression, and all the forms of personal suffering – all the "passion" of the human experience, of the experience of being human. The Paschal Mystery transforms us each year. The scriptures tell a story that we need, because it is *our* living story because of the Holy Spirit's work in and through us.
