33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

We are approaching the last days of the church year. Next weekend is the feast of Christ the King and from here we enter into a new church year. As we near the end of the liturgical year, the mother church brings us scripture readings that focus our attention on the subject of the end times and the need for endurance in our lives. The scripture readings for this Sunday encourage us to persevere in faith as we wait in joyful hope for the coming of the Lord.

In the first reading, the prophet Malachi exhorted the people of his time to walk in the way of the Lord. He spoke of the great day when God will reward the righteous for their good deeds and punish evildoers for their misdeeds. According to Malachi, on the Day of Judgment, God will bring the just to rejoice in the healing rays of the sun. Those who devoted themselves to the works of peace, justice, mercy, and truth will be rewarded with eternal life in God's kingdom.

In the gospel, Jesus predicted the destruction of the magnificent temple in Jerusalem. He stated that the days will come when there will not be left a stone upon another stone that will not be thrown down. This statement speaks a lot about the extent of the calamity that Jesus foresaw as coming upon Jerusalem and her people.

Jesus also foretold other catastrophic events that were bound to happen such as wars, insurrections, earthquakes, famines, and plagues. He cautioned his disciples and future followers that they will undergo great suffering, trials, hostilities and persecution for his sake. But Jesus assured all his faithful ones that not a hair on our head will perish. Jesus' predictions have all come true. Historical accounts reveal that in 70 AD, the Roman troops laid siege to Jerusalem and destroyed the magnificent temple. The Roman troops ransacked the place and took the treasures in the temple to their country. For the Jews who witnessed those difficult times, it felt like an end of their world had come. Despite those troubling times, they persevered in their faith and continued to place their hope in the Lord.

In our lifetime, we have also seen and continue to see upheavals in our world. We have seen wars, insurrections, conflicts, and divisions that continue to threaten human life. We know the anguish that the Russian invasion in Ukraine has brought upon our sisters and brothers in this country and the entire world. We know the loss of thousands of lives, the displacement of millions of livelihoods, loss of homes and incomes. The list of woes gives us reason to be anxious. But Jesus tells us to not fear or despair for these events will not immediately be the end. All he wants us to do is to keep our calm and tread on the path of endurance. What Jesus expects of us is to remain faithful and alert at his coming. We should continue to set our hearts more firmly on God and his eternal kingdom.

Saint Paul admonishes us in the second reading to avoid laziness and idleness in our lives and work diligently for the common good of all people. Saint Paul wants us to learn from him. He was such a hardworking person. Saint Paul earned his living by working with his hands. He did what is right and just. For him, the best way to prepare for the end time is carrying out our everyday duties cheerfully and in faith, hope, and love.

Our Lord Jesus tells us "By your perseverance will you secure your lives" (Luke 21:19). He has invited us into his presence at this Eucharistic table. He calls us to keep our hearts alive to his presence with us and within us. Let us ask the Lord to grant us the grace to persevere in faith and continue to bear witness to his truth before all people. And may he equip us to be faithful and ready for his coming at the end of time or at the hour of our death.
