33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time Be attentive to the signs of the time

The church year is winding down. Next Sunday is the feast of Christ the king and from there we welcome a new liturgical year on the first Sunday of Advent.

This Sunday's readings draw our attention to the end times, final judgment and the need to wait in joyful hope for the coming of the Lord. The readings urge us to wait not in idleness but to be zealous in building God's kingdom on earth.

In the gospel, Jesus talks about the end times, predicting a time of upheavals and great distress that will precede his final coming. He speaks of fearful signs such as wars, insurrections, nations rising against one another, powerful earthquakes, famines, plagues, awesome sights and mighty signs coming from the sky.

Jesus makes it clear that no one knows what day or hour the end will come so he cautions us to be on the constant watch. The return of the Lord will certainly take place. In the meantime, we are encouraged to be steadfast in faith and live wisely and justly. We should strive each day to live a life worthy of our call. Things will not be always easy.

The prophet Daniel inspires us to remain resolute in the Lord. In the first reading, the prophet Daniel offered words of hope and consolation to his fellow Jews who faced persecution and oppression in the hands of pagan rulers such as Nebuchadnezzar. In his vision, he saw Michael, the arch angel standing as guard over God's people.

Using this vision, the prophet Daniel assured the remnant people of Israel that a day of reckoning will come where the righteous ones will rise from the dust to shine as bright as stars for all eternity. The just ones will enjoy eternal life with God while all evildoers will suffer eternal punishment and damnation in hell.

Amidst the chaos and difficulties of our time, we are exhorted to remain faithful to the Lord. We are called to trust in God's constant protection and live each with hope and courage.

In the second reading, the letter to the Hebrews brings us to appreciate the one complete and perfect sacrifice Jesus Christ offered for all of us on the cross. The reading reminds us that Christ serves as our high priest and intercedes for us to his father until the end of the age. Our Lord Jesus gives us new life. Through him, we receive forgiveness, peace, and joy. At every Mass we receive the invitation to encounter the Lord in his sacred gifts. We are nourished by his Word and the Eucharist. As we once again gather around the Eucharistic table, let us open our hearts to the Lord and ask for his grace to continue to serve him with loving devotion. Let us pay heed to his message and be attentive to the signs of our time. With the psalmist, we join together in praying: keep me safe, O Lord, you are my inheritance, my allotted portion and cup!
