2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time: "Do whatever he tells you" (John 2:5).

Having concluded the Christmas season, we are now into the ordinary time of the church's liturgical year. During this season, the church encourages all of us, her members, to grow and mature in the daily expression of our Christian faith. Green is the liturgical color of ordinary time, and it is a good symbol and a great reminder to us about the need for us to strive for growth, transformation, and restoration in our lives.

The readings for this second Sunday in ordinary time talk about God's unending love for us and the need for us to deepen our relationship with the Lord.

In the first reading, the book of the prophet Isaiah gives us a beautiful description of God's relationship with the people of Israel as like that of a husband and his bride. God espoused Himself to the chosen people despite their unfaithfulness and infidelity toward Him. The sins of the people resulted in their many years of captivity in Babylon between 597 BC and 538 BC. God delivered them from bondage and brought them home from exile to their city of Jerusalem. He restored the people of Zion and Jerusalem to Himself and promised to make their righteousness shine for other nations to see their glory.

In the gospel reading, Jesus performed His first public miracle at Cana by changing water into wine. Jesus attended a wedding banquet at Cana together with His disciples and His mother, Mary. In the course of the feast the newly wedded couple run out of wine. You can imagine the situation. The bridegroom and his bride were on the verge of incurring public embarrassment. Jesus' mother noticed the problem and she drew His attention to it. Mary said to Jesus "They have no wine." She instructed the servers, "Do whatever He tells you." Jesus did not turn down His mother's request even though His hour had not yet come. He told the servants to fill the six empty jars with water, draw some out, and take it to the headwaiter to taste it. When the headwaiter tasted it, the six jars of water had all turned into finest wine. We are told that all were amazed and the miracle caused the disciples to believe in Jesus.

The story of the changing of water into wine has a lot to teach us about our Christian life. Sometimes the wine of our commitment to God and others runs out. In our relationships we lose the spirit of mutual love, respect, care, and concern for one another.

Our mother Mary continues to be our powerful intercessor. She notices our wine running out and urges us to do whatever her son, Jesus Christ tells us; to fill our water jars up and for Him to turn them into the choicest wine. In this celebration let us bring our spiritual jars before the Lord and ask Him to replenish and refresh us with His transforming Word and the Eucharist.

Let us pray for God's Spirit to empower each of us to use our individual gifts and talents to serve the good and the benefit of all. God bless.
