“Give them some food yourselves”: Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi)

This Sunday, we celebrate one of the most profound mysteries of our Catholic faith—the **Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ**. This great feast invites us to renew our belief in the **Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist**, His Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity.

The readings for this solemn day reveal the depth of God's love and His provision through this sacred mystery. They remind us that God has always provided for His people, and that Jesus now offers Himself to us in the Eucharist to **nourish our souls and strengthen our faith**.

In the **first reading**, we encounter **Melchizedek**, the high priest and king of Salem, who offered bread and wine in thanksgiving to God. This ancient gesture foreshadows the Eucharist.

Melchizedek blessed Abram after his victory and this sacred exchange becomes a sign of **friendship, blessing, and covenant**—a sign that Jesus fulfills perfectly.

In the **Gospel**, Jesus fed a vast crowd with five loaves and two fish. The people, weary and hungry, were fed abundantly. Jesus took the little that was available, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to the disciples to distribute them to the people. They all ate and were satisfied and twelve baskets of leftovers were gathered. This miracle points to the Eucharist, where Jesus feeds us not with earthly bread, but with the **Bread of Life**.

In the **second reading**, Saint Paul gives us the earliest written account of the **institution of the Eucharist**. He recalls how, at the Last Supper, Jesus took bread and wine, and said: "This is my body....and This is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many." These are not mere metaphors or symbolic gestures. They are not symbolic words—they are words of a Savior who gives Himself completely for the life of the world.

At every Mass, we bring simple gifts of bread and wine. Through the power of the Holy Spirit and the words of consecration spoken by the priest, these gifts are transformed. This is the mystery **transubstantiation**, the substance of bread and wine become the very **Body and Blood of Christ**, even though their appearances remain unchanged. Though our eyes see bread and wine, **our faith sees Jesus, truly present, truly alive, and truly with us**. In the Eucharist, Christ nourishes us, strengthens our faith and unites us more deeply with Him and one another.

Today, we give thanks for the gift of the Eucharist and for those who help share it—our **Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion**. This ministry requires deep faith, a prayerful heart, and a humble spirit. To our Eucharistic Ministers: **thank you**. You bring Christ to others, in church, in homes, and hospital. You are signs of the Lord's love and care. As we celebrate this solemn feast, let us renew our love for the Eucharist. Let us come to the altar with grateful hearts and strive to live as the **Body of Christ in the world**. **God bless.** Fr. Dr. Ben
