26th Sunday in Ordinary Time: Reaching Out to the Lazarus at our Gate

This Sunday's readings shake us from spiritual complacency. They challenge us to look beyond comfort, recognize the suffering around us and respond with compassion.

In the first reading, the prophet Amos delivered a sharp warning to those who enjoy comfort while ignoring the poor. He condemned self-indulgence and indifference, declaring that such comfort will not last.

His words echo across time, urging us to examine our own lives, whether we are too comfortable to care or too distracted to notice. Amos reminds us that indifference has consequences, and comfort without compassion is fleeting. The responsorial psalm lifts our gaze to God who defends the oppressed and uplifts the poor. It calls us to reflect God's mercy by caring deeply for those most in need.

In the Gospel, Jesus told the parable of the rich man and Lazarus, a story of contrast and consequence. The rich man lived in luxury, blind to the suffering at his doorstep. Lazarus, covered with sores, longed for scraps that fell from the rich man's table. After death, their fortunes were reversed. Lazarus was comforted in the bosom of Abraham, while the rich man suffered in torment.

The rich man's regret came too late. His life of greed and indifference had eternal consequences. The parable is a wake-up call. It teaches us that actions matter, that our indifference has consequences. We must not wait until it is too late to love.

In the second reading, Saint Paul urges us to "fight the good fight" and pursue righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience and gentleness. These virtues guide us on our journey toward eternal life and help us to live as true disciples. Lazarus lives among us. He is the hungry person, the lonely elder, the refugee seeking safety, the neighbor silently struggling. He is at our gate.

This week, let us ask God for eyes to see the Lazarus in our midst. Let us pray for hearts that feel and hands that serve. May we respond with love, generosity and courage knowing that in every act of mercy, we meet Christ Himself in those near and far.
