
Welcome! Bienvenido! Mabuhay!

A HOLYDAY The Assumption of the Virgin Mary Thursday, 15 August 2024

Mass Schedule 12:00pm—Saint Francis 12:05pm—Saint Mary 12:15pm—Cathedral

The Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary was already being celebrated on 15 August in the 5th century. It was not until 1 November 1950, that Pope Pius XII proclaimed as dogma Mary's assumption body and soul into heaven. In the Apostles' Creed, we profess our faith in the "resurrection of the body" and in "life everlasting". This is the ultimate goal and meaning of our life's journey. This promise of faith is already accomplished in Mary, who is the "sign of sure hope and comfort" (Preface).

It is interesting to note that the liturgy – through the biblical texts taken from the Book of Revelation and the Gospel according to Luke (the Canticle of the Magnificat) - helps us to pray. The Gospel suggests that Mary's mystery be read in the light of her prayer, the Magnificat, that is, through the lens of gratuitous love that extends from generation to generation, and the predilection of the least and the poor. The Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, body and soul, is an eloquent sign of how not only the "soul" but also the "body" is included in the biblical observation that "God found it very good" (Gn 1:31), so much so that in the Virgin Mary, "our flesh" would be assumed into heaven. This does not exempt us from committing ourselves to life here on earth. We are driven to commit ourselves during our present life to reflect the Magnificat, to be attentive to all our brothers and sisters beginning with the weakest and most vulnerable.

John 6

The Bread of Life Discourse—Introduction

Chapter 6 of John is called the "Bread of Life Discourse". It encompasses the story of the multiplication of fishes and loaves, walking on the water, the teaching of Jesus as 'bread of 'life' and the response of various people to the shocking and difficult teaching of Jesus. Over the next five Sunday we will hear the entire chapter, excluding the walking on the water scene. It is a period to reflect on the Holy Eucharist in which we Are offered by Jesus his very self in Word and Holy Communion.

Like the conversation with the Samaritan woman at the well moved from bodily thirst to spiritual thirst likewise, chapter 6 moves from the issue of bodily hunger to spiritual hunger and eternal life.

Important spiritual questions rise up throughout the chapter. In the face of human hunger we continue to ask, "Where can we buy enough food for so many to eat?" Where indeed? Hunger is an ever constant, even in our wealthy society. 35 million people go hungry every day in the USA. We can often feel overwhelmed by human need and ask of our meagre resources, "There is a boy here who has five loaves and two fish; but what good are these for so many? We can descend into inaction because we often see situations from a limited viewpoint. Do we ever pray for imagination and the ability to see new possibilities? Have we forgotten how to dream? Like the woman at the well, Nicodemus who comes to Jesus in the night, and the hungry crowds, our sight can be limited and Jesus' teachings can overwhelm us.

In such a situation, what we are expecting from Jesus? The crowds will ask "What sign can you do, that we may see and believe you?" Does Jesus have to prove himself to us before we believe in him? What is the role of trust and faith in our relationship with Jesus?

What does Jesus mean when he teaches he is the bread that came down from heaven? What does it mean to eat the flesh and drink the blood of Jesus? These questions still confound and divide Christians. Jesus asks us, "Does this [teaching] shock you?" People have asked incredulously, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" Have you ever asked that question?

Many today, as then, have left following Jesus. His teachings can be very hard to understand and accept. Thus a pointed question of faith to each of us, "Do you want to leave?" Peter answers for many of us, "Master, to whom shall we go?"

During this month contemplate the questions posed by the Gospels. Read and mediate on the passages prior to Sunday worship. The schedule for the passages is as follows:
