Today the Church celebrates Gaudete Sunday, Rejoicing Sunday. We rejoice because we hear the voice of John the Baptist, in the desert, announcing the coming of the Savior. Hopefully you have noticed that the readings for the first two weeks of Advent have been focused on the second coming of Jesus and preparing for our earthly death. The third and fourth weeks focus on God coming into the world to dwell among us.

This is a question we imagine Jesus asking us. Can you answer, "Who do you say that I am?" Reflecting on this question is part of our preparation for the Advent season, preparing for the coming of Jesus. We are invited to know Jesus and be in relationship with him. In Matthew's Gospel Jesus is speaking about true disciples. Some disciples ask him, "'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name? Did we not drive out demons in your name? Did we not do mighty deeds in your name?' Then I will declare to them solemnly, 'I never *knew* you. Depart from me, you evildoers." Here the disciples are telling Jesus all things they did in this life, which is part of our faith, but Jesus tells them they did not take time to get to know him.

How would you answer the question "What does my relationship with Jesus look like?" A more challenging question to ask is "What would Jesus say your relationship with him looks like?" Our deeds and works in this life are important, however they take on meaning and importance in and through Jesus whom we know.

St. Paul provides the way in which we come to know Jesus, prayer. When engage in a prayerful dialog with God the Father, Jesus the Son, and the Holy Spirit we come to know their voice and their presence. Our prayer this Sunday can be what St. Paul prays for:

May the God of peace make you perfectly holy and may you entirely, spirit, soul, and body, be preserved blameless for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. The one who calls you is faithful, and he will also accomplish it.


Come to know our Lord Jesus Christ who invites us into relationship. May the peace of Christ be with you this Advent.




### Let's Keep Christ in Christmas
