

St. Jude the Apostle School is Meeting Their Students Academic Needs in

New & Exciting Ways!!

This fall, St. Jude the Apostle School, adopted a new block schedule for the students in grades K-5. What does this mean and how does it benefit our students? All of our students in grades K-5 participate in benchmark assessments 3x a year that provides wonderful data to our administration and faculty on each individual child's current academic knowledge in the areas of Math and English Language Arts. This data, along with their performance on classroom assignments and assessments, is analyzed by the faculty and principal to determine students that would benefit from advanced placement in these two curriculum areas. Multiple students in grades 2-5 have been flagged so far this year as being in need of an advanced, challenging curriculum in Math and/or English Language Arts.

So, what is done to continue to support these students who are meeting and exceeding the academic standards in their current grade placement? Well, a great deal of time was spent creating a master schedule for grades K-5 that reserves certain times of the day for all homeroom teachers to teach Math and ELA at the same time. Why is that important? This allows a student to advance to the next grade level for Math and/or ELA and not miss any other important instruction in the other curriculum areas. For example, from 9:25-11:10am all K-5 teachers are teaching ELA every day. So, students A who is in 2nd grade and has demonstrated above grade level skills and strategies in reading, spelling, writing and all areas of ELA travels to 3rd grade to work with the 3rd grade teacher and students at a level that meets and challenges their individual ELA level. The same is done for math each day when all teachers teach math from 12:55-2:05pm.

Why is this important and very innovative at an elementary level? Our students individual academic needs are met and students are not "bored" participating in lessons for skills they have already mastered. It also frees up each homeroom teacher, as well as the AIS specialist, to develop innovative and creative lessons for the students that are on-grade-level or below, because their advanced students are learning from the next grade level teacher who has already created such lessons and activities for that grade level.

The fall diagnostic assessments and faculty data meetings have identified three students in grade 2 that have been advanced to grade 3 (1 for Math and 2 for ELA), as well a 1 student in grade 3 that is advancing to grade 4 for ELA. All of these children are finding the above grade level work to be challenging but attainable and the teachers report that they are exactly where they need to be in these areas of study.

GOSPEL REFLECTION, ADORATION and MINISTRIES

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On the feast of Christ the King we celebrate the reign of Christ, which transcends any notion of kingship that we can imagine. In the reign of God, the dominion of Jesus Christ extends over all things in both heaven and earth; He is the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. His power is unlike anything of this earth, but Jesus does not use His power to rule over us. Instead, He chose to empty himself of all this power and come as our servant. He came in our likeness to be with us in our struggles sharing with us even our darkest hour.

We learn a lot about the kingship of Christ in the last few moments of His earthly life, because it was His willingness to accept this horrible death, His crown a wreath of thorns, His thrown a cross, that He established His reign in our hearts.

In that very same act, He showed His absolute love for us and His absolute dominion over the created world because He destroyed the power that death has over us. Through His death we are assured of His victory, because even death could not hold Him.

Jesus spoke of His kingdom being 'not of this world', unlike any earthly kind and He rejected the kind of kingdom that was common in His time. His kingdom would be established through the power of love and not through any earthly power.

His kingdom being 'not of this world' did not mean that it would

not be 'in this world'. He called His followers to further the kingdom He established by living lives of justice and compassion, understanding and generosity. The values of His kingdom are based in the beatitudes, not on the principles of success and prestige that seem so important in our modern society.

So, how is this feast day relevant for us today? Today, the mission of the whole body of Christ is to build up His kingdom by following the His example. Jesus invites all of us who exercise authority to use it for the common good. The Gospel this week makes clear how we are to spread the values of His kingdom by loving our neighbors as ourselves.

If we want to be recognized as the children of His kingdom then we have to demonstrate it's values in our daily lives. It is up to us to make Jesus' reign be felt on earth. To bring about His kingdom we need to abandon what this world considers important, we have to bring comfort and hope to the weak and the sick and powerless in our society. So, this Sunday, let it be with humble hearts that we renew our allegiance to the King of Kings.
